

I refer once again to my letter to you of the 22nd November lnst, to my resignation of the 14th December, all dealing with the subject of the brutality committed by the Nome Guard under the control of Government's Administrative officers.

Once again I regest that Your knowlengy has not seen fit to concessing an communications to you on this subject or to give me en indication that anything effective is being done to recedy this phaseful situation. How, on the 7th December, I personally drew your attention come again to the interference and hostility that then making equitries into these complaints, Your knowlength agreed your intention of holding an "off the record" meeting between Folice and Administration in order to avoid much troubles in future. So far as I am aware no arrangements for such a meeting have yet been made.

Recently I made a tour with the Assistant Coumissioner of my Criminal Investigation Department to visit C.II., officers in the Central Province. I assured them that investigations into allegations of brutality must be pressed home to completion in all cases and that nobody, whatever his position in Covernment or elsewhere, could be allowed to interfere with these duties of the

The new and increasing confidence which the African is beginning to show in the importiality of the Folice is already having its result in an increased masher of reports of brutality and marder. Allegations, which Africans have previously been afraid to make, for fear of reprisals,

I have asked my Assistant Commissioner to let me have a summary of the position of such current police enquiries, a copy of which I enclose for Your Excellency's information.

I see that after the Christmas recess the reasons for my resignation, which have not yet been disclosed and which at present are not understood by the public, are to be debated in the House of Lords. I therefore request that a copy of this lettor, together with a copy of the report attached, be forwarded to

- (i) to improve the security arrangements in the Nyanza Province by strengthening the Administration, the Special Branch and the supervisory staff at African schools;
- (ii) to take steps to speed up development by giving special support to agricultural, veterinary and medical schemes.

The Governor and the Minister for Finance intended to seek funds for the purpose from the United Kingdom during their forthcoming visit to London. The DEPUTY GOVERNOR said that he had assured the Administration in Nyanza that agitators, who tried to hinder reforms, would not be telerated. He was consulting the Attorney General about the powers needed by the Government to deal with the few dissidents.

THE WAR COUNCIL




